Parish Council News

The Annual Village Meeting took place in May followed by the first Parish Council meeting of the 2024/25 Council year, at which annual reports on the activities and achievements of the Parish Council and the Village Hall Committee were provided. There were no questions from the public in the Public Participation section. Sam Frost was re-elected Chair, and all existing members of the Working Groups agreed to continue for another year.

James Sheppard of Wiltshire Council provided an update on the past year which covered balancing of the council budgets, ringfencing of adult care and children's services and more money for highway maintenance. In a similar vein the village Transport Working Group has been investigating improved signage following the recent traffic congestion in the village in an attempt to divert drivers during such incidents.

Bob Tanner has stepped down from the Parish Council and was thanked for his contribution. This means a vacancy has arisen. Meet Your Church

Completing the series of interviews with residents who dedicate their spare time to running our local institutions as volunteers, this month we meet the rest of the Church team.

Meet Nicky Irwin - Churchwarden

Nicky Irwin has lived in this area all her life, having been born at Savernake hospital and attended school in Ogbourne St George. After moving to Leicestershire, she and husband Richard moved back to the area just before the birth of their second child Betsy; Conrad, their eldest, started his school life at Ogbourne St George & St Andrew primary. After three years in Wiltshire, they moved to Edinburgh with Richard's work and after many years in Edinburgh they settled back here 16 years ago.

Nicky is a Churchwarden, and her role is to ensure the smooth running of the Church. She says she's lucky to share it with Brian Utton, Deputy Churchwarden. The role is wide ranging and the 'visible' aspects of it include preparing the church for services, handing out books and running the music player, as well as fundraising, which whilst not specifically a Churchwarden job, is one that she enjoys. It includes various activities from door-to-door campaigns to organising and supporting events. The fete is the biggest annual event, and while the preparation can be arduous, sharing it with Lesley Ayres means the results and appreciation by all involved make it rewarding.

There are also the 'invisible' tasks such as form filling and compiling statistics for the diocesan records, plus identifying maintenance requirements, the urgency for repair and how best to resolve them. Nicky says that they are lucky to have a willing group of local volunteers and supporters, so many of the jobs can be completed at the biannual maintenance days, and quite often small tasks are completed quietly by fantastic people.

She describes herself as pretty extrovert and says she most enjoys meeting people and making things better. Christmas time is particularly rewarding as it is incredibly busy with many services, lots of people and great excitement. She's proud of the fact that when she first joined the Parochial Church Council (PCC), there was a need to raise funds which were in decline; and after a couple of fundraising campaigns and a series of events, they succeeded in reversing this trend.

During her tenure she would like to find ways to make Church more accessible and relevant to more people, by involving more people in what it does, through joining in maintenance days, becoming members of the PCC and/or helping with events.

What she likes most about this part of the country are the Marlborough Downs and the serenity of the area. She loves being able to walk out of the house onto circular routes for miles mainly on tracks, to the west to Barbury Castle, and to the East to Liddington Castle. Her parents both have strong ties with the area, and with both parents and other family nearby, she says 'it really is home'.

Meet Olly Iliffe - Secretary

Olly Iliffe grew up in Ogbourne St George and, after a brief career in law in the City, he returned to the village in 2012 to start farming.

From about 2015 he has been part of the PCC, as secretary, taking minutes of meetings and attempting to be of use generally with services, events and church maintenance and improvement. [He has also been a foundation governor of the village school for about the same length of time, a role which involves preserving and developing the Church of England ethos of the school.]

Despite the exhaustion of lambing, Easter is his favourite church festival reminding him of both the personal challenge and appeal of Jesus' crucifixion and the hope of his empty tomb. Otherwise, it is hard for a farmer not to enjoy harvest – except for the inevitable combine breakdown – feeling, as the Psalmist does, that we "sow in tears and reap with joy", this year being no exception to the former part of that rule!

Nonetheless, he also values the rhythm of church life and particularly enjoys the regular 8.30am Book of Common Prayer communion service – sharing in the words of Thomas Cranmer which remain such a powerful expression of English Christianity today – and the much more informal Café Church, which, 'allows us to discuss the Bible reading for the day and much else besides over cake and a cup of coffee. Do please come and join us!'

He's married to Caroline, and they have a daughter, Isabelle, at the local primary school and a son, Johnny, at Little Dragons Pre-School.

Olly enjoys gardening and reading – mainly novels, biographies and history. He was particularly influenced by Dostoevsky's novels and the writings of C.S. Lewis, to whom he probably owes his conversion to Christianity – or, at least, the decision to start reading the Bible again with a fresh pair of eyes about 14 years ago.

Anna Burch then spotted the remaining eight ducklings crossing her road to hide under a parked car. I quickly joined her with a box, and along with our children, we scooped them up from under the car and put them in the box. The lonely one at home perked right up once he was reunited with his siblings. A friend with a farm on the outskirts of Mildenhall then said he would be able to take them, and he has been caring for them since and sends regular updates. They are currently growing in adult feathers! All's well that ends well!
